What was “practical abolitionism”? (See quote on p. 10)

On p. 87, Hunt writes that the veterans set forth “a puzzling and fragmented voice regarding African Americans”—how would you describe this voice?

How did the veterans treat Reconstruction, for the most part?

What did you think of Hunt’s comparison (pp. 99, 101) of the Civil War to a 20<sup>th</sup>-century foreign war?

Did anything surprise you about the book?

Was there as much about emancipation memory in the book as you expected?
