From the Dean

This month's From the Dean column is devoted to a reflection on our coming participation in the Second Harvest Food Bank food drive. Please plan to bring dry cereal and/or canned goods with you to worship on Sundays, February 21 and 28. The collection bins will be placed throughout the church campus. Give, understanding that your faith depends on it. TEK+

"If a brother or sister lacks food and one of you says, 'go in peace,' and yet do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that. Faith if it has no works is dead." James 2:15-17

The signs of the times have urgency about them. Folks are out of work, losing their homes and struggling to put food on their table to feed their families. In Davidson County alone, demand for food assistance from Second Harvest Food Bank of Middle Tennessee is up 38% over last year. Fifty percent of those needing food are children and ten percent are senior citizens—both of whom are the most vulnerable groups in our communities.

The season of Lent calls Christians to remember the mystery of our redemption in Christ and to more fully participate in his life-giving spirit. What better way during Lent to honor the call to be his hands and feet in a world in need than by helping to feed the hungry? Working for Second Harvest I have the privilege to witness daily how our verbal proclamation of the Good News is connected in a powerful way to the embodiment of our faith, a living out of the Good News. As volunteers dedicate their time to sorting through donated food that goes quickly into our Emergency Food Box program to help feed our hungry neighbors, I am reminded of how when we act and behave like followers of Jesus our faith is alive and resounds loudly.

The Prophet Isaiah says, "And if you give yourself to the hungry and satisfy the desire of the afflicted, then your light will rise in darkness and your gloom will become like midday" (58:10). I encourage each and everyone one of us to lean into this season of Lent. As disciples of Jesus Christ, we can do no other but reach out to any and all who are in need. Feeding the hungry is a profound act of love and helps to restore dignity to a mother or father who cannot provide for their hungry child or a senior citizen who is eating too little to maintain good health.

During Christ Church Cathedral's Lenten Food Drive each one of us has a choice, to pass by those in need, or to take action to help others. This Lent, let us choose to contribute abundantly and rejoice in knowing that Jesus did not labor in vain to teach us of discipleship and the service of the poor.

"I tell you the truth, whatever you did for the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me." (Matthew 25:40)

The 2010 Budget

This past year has been filled with many blessings in the midst of our economic turmoil and continued world-wide conflict. Christ Church Cathedral continues to be a place of hope. This past year we celebrated

Anne Stevenson's twenty years of dedicated service in our parish life together, the Diocese of Tennessee and throughout the Nashville community. We remember the Fisk Jubilee Singers who shared their unique musical talents here at the Cathedral and we have continued to bear witness to God in serving those who are in need here and abroad from Littoral to South Africa to Baghdad. Our parish has grown to 2,158 parishioners during an interim period of twenty-eight months, without a Dean and Rector. There is a new beginning with the recent celebration of a new ministry and installation of The Very Reverend Timothy E. Kimbrough as Dean and Rector on November 22, 2009.

We are pleased to report that Christ Church Cathedral is financially secure and prepared

to support the clergy and staff in pursuing our mission "to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ." Our vision remains "to be a welcoming place; a model of service in our community and diocese in liturgy, spiritual formation, education, outreach, stewardship and pastoral care; and a parish willing to take risks in pursuing our Mission."

Our stewardship campaign of "The Abiding Power of Hope" is now complete. We have 574 pledging households for a total of \$1,903,019. There are 75 new pledges of \$93,655. Amidst the economic difficulties, 186 pledges were increased by \$131,121 and 80 pledges were decreased by \$153,166. We are truly thankful for each pledge and appreciate the leadership provided by our stewardship co-chairs, Jeff Yarbrow and Scott Viebranz.

As a parish "willing to take risks in pursuing our Mission" the Vestry, at our January 2010 meeting approved a 2010 budget of \$ 2,567,569 with a deficit of \$ 97,800 that retains our staff, provides all non-clergy staff with a 3% cost of living increase and maintains the current programs. We are currently served by three full-time priests (Timothy, Anne, and Geoffrey) and the

Reverend Gene Manning at ¾ time. The Reverend Gene Manning will be full-time effective April 1, anticipating the Reverend Canon Geoffrey Butcher's retirement on May 2. This in effect reduces our clergy to three full time priests.

The Finance Committee and past wardens have been good stewards of our funds and we have been able to build an adequate reserve that will allow us to fund the deficit budget for 2010. Although the Vestry and Clergy would have preferred a truly balanced budget for 2010, it is the belief of the Vestry and Clergy that this budget will allow us to remain on solid footing in this new beginning of ministry with Dean Kimbrough. It should be noted that this model is not sustainable for 2011 without an increase in giving.

Theological Education Sunday February 7

Sunday, February 7, has been designated Theological Education Sunday by the Episcopal Church. In order to rightly honor this designation the Dean has invited the three seminarians from Christ Church Cathedral, currently in the process leading to ordination as priests in the Episcopal Church, to join us in the assembly at worship and during the Focused and Faithful Forum from 9:45-10:45 a.m. *Danielle Thompson, Stanford Adams, and Anna Russell Kelly* will each preach at one of the morning's liturgies and the three of them will join the Dean in a panel discussion during the Forum highlighting the special challenges and gifts of vocational formation.

Further, the Dean and Vestry together have earmarked the undesignated offering for Sunday, February 7, for the direct benefit of these three seminarians. Customarily the first Sunday loose offering is designated for use by the Dean's Discretionary Fund. Any and all undesignated funds given on Sunday, February 7, will be dedicated to defraying the expenses of a seminary education for Danielle, Stanford, and Anna Russell.

Ash Wednesday February 17...



Ash Wednesday is the first day of Lent, when we begin a time of reflection, self-examination, and spiritual redirection. Lent originated in the very earliest days of the Church as preparation for Easter, when the faithful rededicated themselves and when

converts were instructed in the faith and were prepared for baptism. Jesus was sent by the Holy Spirit into the wilderness for forty days to prepare for his ministry. By observing Lent, we join Jesus on his fast in the wilderness as we consider our mortality and dependence on God. During services on **Ash Wednesday at 7 a.m., 12:15 p.m., and 6 p.m.**, the foreheads of worshipers are marked with an ashen cross, because in the Bible a mark on the forehead is a symbol of a person's ownership. Being marked with a cross symbolizes that the person belongs to God. This is in imitation of the spiritual mark that is put on in baptism, when we are "marked as Christ's own forever." The ashes are traditionally made from palm fronds from the previous year's Palm Sunday observance.

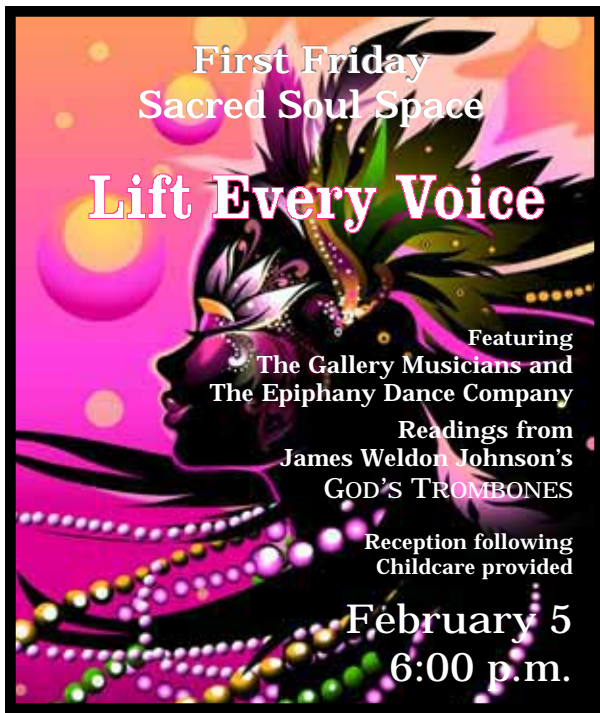

GOD'S TROMBONES is a new dramatization of African-American folk sermons in a colorful theatrical presentation with original music, including jazz and new age selections, and traditional gospel music and dance in celebration of Black History Month. Included in the cast is the Cathedral's Deacon, the Reverend Dolores Nicholson. James Weldon Johnson used the image of the trombone to represent the resonance of the voices -- the compelling and persuasive nature of the folk preacher. He named the trombone as "the instrument possessing above all others the power to express the wide and varied range of emotions encompassed by the human voice -- and with greater amplitude." Literary scholars contend that no other modern American writer of the twentieth century has constructed a fictional world so energetically and forthrightly charged by religious investigation as the one Flannery O'Connor has created. As a "literary theologian," O'Connor demonstrated that religion, far from being an impediment to art, may serve as the vital center of the artist's imagination.

This series will focus on three of her short stories - *Revelation*, *The Displaced Person*, and *Parker's Back*. The recurring theme for this series will be: "What universal themes from the human drama of existence has Flannery O'Connor *incarnated* in language and what theological statements does she invite us to examine?"

Victor Judge serves as a lecturer at Vanderbilt University Divinity School where he teaches courses on the literary theologians Flannery O'Connor, Albert Camus, John Donne, Emily Dickinson, and Gerard Manley Hopkins, S.J. He also serves as the School's registrar, as editor of the theological magazine *The Spire*, and as advisor to *Marginalia: to the Least of These*, a student group dedicated to working with the homeless. He received his undergraduate and graduate degrees from George Peabody College for Teachers and is in the thirtieth year of his vocation in higher education.

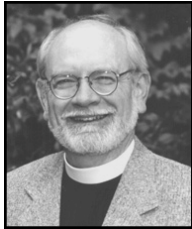
