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About Us

St. Luke's was founded in 1913 to serve the medical needs of the women and children whose male relatives were inmates in the state penitentiary. In 1920, St. Luke's relocated to its present site and continued serving as a clinic until 1996, when TennCare cuts forced the agency to terminate these services. Since that time, St. Luke's has continued to evolve and is now the only major social service agency in the area offering a variety of programs including childcare, mobile meals, emergency food, home repairs, tax assistance, toy store, adult computer classes, summer camp and health assessments.

Our Mission

To help low income working families, seniors, and individuals in West Nashville achieve their potential and prevent problems that threaten the stability of families and community.

ST. LUKE'S PROGRAMS IN 2007

- 636 individuals in 219 households received Emergency Financial Assistance
- 99 children enrolled in Preschool
- 94 children enrolled in YES youth programs
- 64 children attended Lone Oak Summer Camp
- 976 children received toys through Toy Store
- 393 families adopted for holiday season
- 23,340 Mobile Meals served
- 232 tax returns prepared resulting in refunds of \$318,599
- 12 girls participating in the St. Luke's Girl Scout troop
- 8 girls participating in the Girl's World program
- Community Events:
 - 75 in attendance at May Block Party
 - 300 in attendance at Halloween Party
 - 100 in attendance at Thanksgiving Event/Health Fair

ST. LUKE'S PARTNER PROGRAMS

- 496 Counseling sessions performed by Family & Children's Services
- 25 Homes repaired by 111 volunteers in partnership with the West Nashville Partnership
- 76 cats and 92 dogs in 101 households received spay/neuter services through the Nashville Humane Association's Rover Clinic
- 55 children enrolled in Youth Life Learning Center youth programs
- 37 females & 39 males received education through the Domestic Violence Intervention Center
- 71 boys participating in the Boy Scout troop through a partnership with Boy Scouts of America
- Second Harvest Programs:
 - 7,634 individuals received food through our food bank
 - 496 Commodities boxes delivered
 - 55 seniors received Senior Helpings each month (January through August)
- 91 individuals who received English as a Learned Language education and 4 individuals received further literacy support through Nashville Adult Literacy Council
