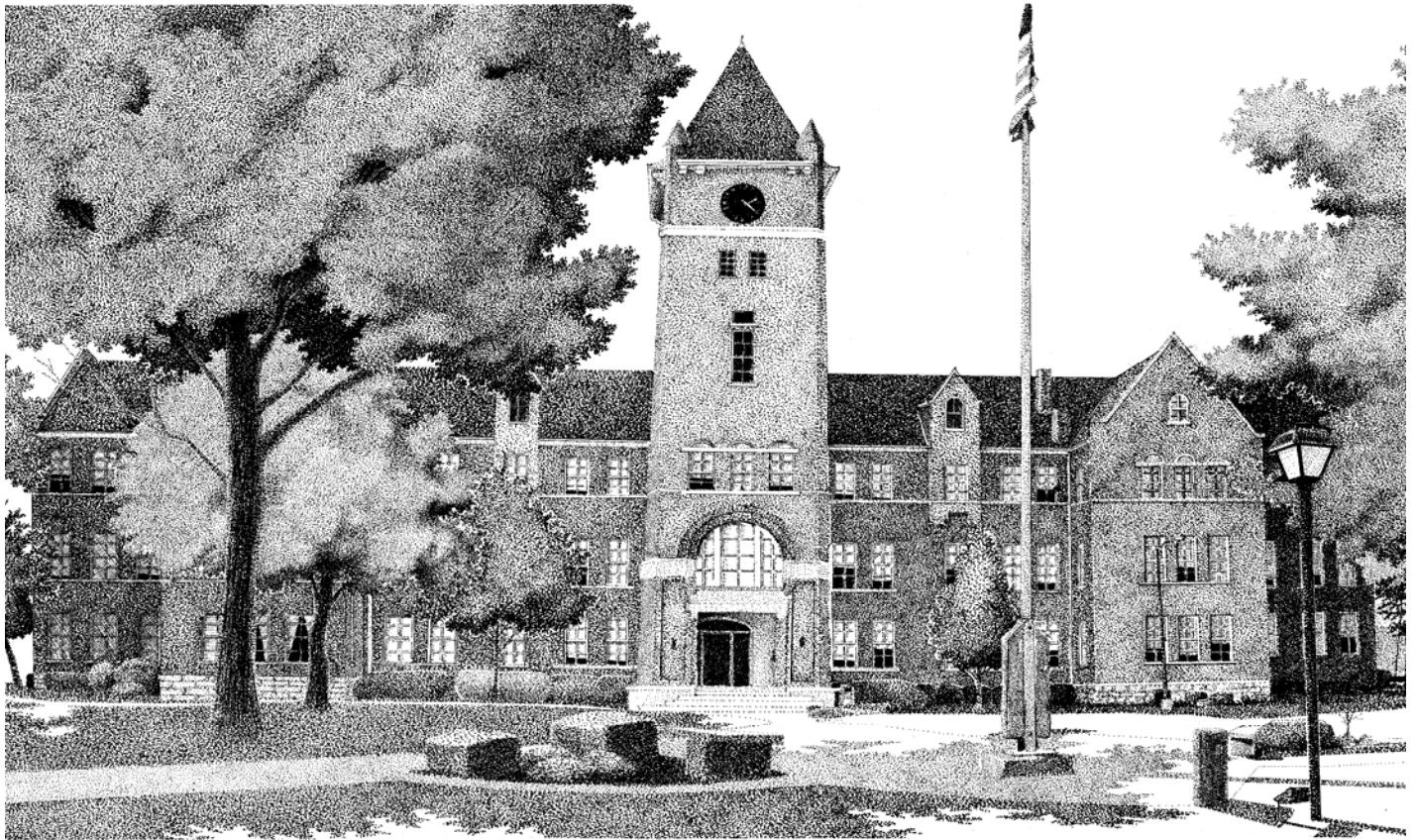

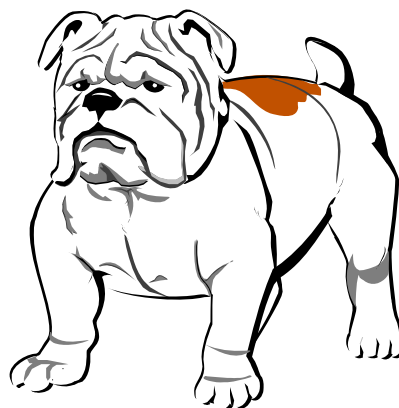

Bulldog Priority Registration Fall 2010

Welcome to Cumberland University's Bulldog Priority Registration Process. Please follow these procedures for completing online registration.

After you have picked up your copy of the CU Register and registration form, you should:

1. Make an appointment with your advisor and your advisor only (based on the number of earned hours*).

*Undergraduate students will meet with their faculty advisors during a specified window of time. Students with **90+** hours should see their advisor for priority registration **April 5- April 9**. Students with **30-89** hours should see their advisor for priority registration **April 12-April 16**. Students with **0-29** hours should see their advisor for priority registration **April 19-April 23**.

2. Make sure that you have a copy of your transcript, transfer evaluation and graduation evaluation if you have requested one.

Compare the classes you have completed with classes required for your program of study, by using your transcript on the student e-portal and the CU catalog available on: http://www.cumberland.edu/catalogs_handbooks .

3. Review your account online or contact the Business Office to verify that you do not have an outstanding balance or a hold that would prevent you from completing a schedule with your advisor.
4. Meet with your advisor at the appropriate time. Work with your advisor to complete a schedule that has the courses needed to proceed toward your graduation. The faculty advisor will input the schedule with the student present, and together they will lock in the schedule. A copy will be printed for both the student and the advisor to insure that the schedule is "locked".
5. Receive a copy of your schedule with current charges from your advisor.
6. Fill out the FERPA release form in order to update privacy information.

The faculty advisor will provide a checklist of post registration instructions that will include information about Student Financial Services, Residence Life, Student Affairs, and Business Office requirements. When this process is complete, undergraduate students will be "priority registered" for fall classes (and summer if needed). All undergraduate students for the fall semester must contact the Business Office to become official by 4:30 p.m. on Monday, August 23, 2010 to avoid the \$150.00 late fee.

Once you have completed Bulldog Priority Registration with your faculty advisor, please review the following steps to complete the process.

Checklist for Fall 2010 Bulldog Priority Registration
(once you have completed the registration process)

Student Financial Services: All Students

Visit Student Financial Services (Memorial Hall, Room 103) to ensure that all Financial Aid is in process and/or complete, including:

- FAFSA** has been processed
- Tax returns have been signed and submitted
- Loan applications have been submitted
- Athletic/Fine Arts scholarships have been signed and submitted

Housing: Returning Students

- Fill out appropriate Housing information, if needed
- Turn in Housing Re-Application Form to Residence Life Office

Business Office: Required for All Students

- To become Official, you must confirm that **ALL** charges, financial aid, your name, address, and current phone number are correct.
- Contact the Business Office (Memorial Hall, room 109) in person or by phone (615-547-1218 or 615-547-1250) to confirm you schedule.
- Be prepared to pay any balance due by cash, check, money order, VISA, MC, DISCOVER or AMEX, or complete a FACTS payment plan (available online or in the Business Office). Students on employer-paid plans must provide company payment policy on company letterhead and sign a promissory note.
- After paying any balance due, you will be added to the class rolls as an **Official** student. All undergraduate students must be official by 4:30 p.m. on Monday, August 23, 2010 to avoid the \$150.00 late fee.
- After you become official, you will receive a Fall 2010 sticker for your student ID card, and your Schedule and Statement will be stamped "**OFFICIAL STUDENT**".
- Keep your stamped copy of the Schedule and Statement along with all receipts.
- Confirm you completed the **FERPA** form.

Student ID Cards & Parking Permit

- Each **Official** student must obtain a parking permit for the 2010-2011 academic year from the Office of Student Life on the second floor of Labry Hall. You must know your license plate number, make, model and year of your vehicle. Failure to register your vehicle on campus will result in a \$100 fine.
- Returning students must have a current Cumberland University ID and have it validated in the Business Office. If you do not have a current ID, please go to the Office of Student Affairs and have an ID made.

If you are going to be full time during the summer (12 or more hours) you must make arrangements for all of your charges at the beginning of the May term.

PRIORITY REGISTRATION FOR CURRENTLY ENROLLED STUDENTS

Bulldog Priority Registration for Summer 2010 will take place beginning April 5th and continue as follows: **April 5 to April 9th students with 90 or more earned hours. April 12th to April 16th students with 59 to 89 earned hours and students with 30 to 58 earned hours. April 19th to April 23rd students with 29 or less earned hours. Bulldog Priority Registration will be an online process with your advisor. Every student must meet with the advisor that they have been assigned to.**

ENTERING STUDENTS – All students enrolling for the first time must complete all admission requirements/processes prior to beginning registration. Specific questions should be addressed to the Office of Admissions at (615-547-1224).

STUDENTS NEARING GRADUATION – Any student nearing graduation is encouraged to complete the registration process as soon as possible in order that space may be reserved in the needed classes. The University does not guarantee a specific course will be offered during the anticipated final term of enrollment. The University urges students who are nearing graduation to consult with the Vice President of Academic Affairs, the Registrar, the Academic School Dean, and/or their advisor to ensure that the needed courses or appropriate substitutions will be offered during their remaining term(s) of enrollment.

SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS – The University uses the Social Security number for permanent/official record purposes. To facilitate your registration please have this number with you upon arrival. For those not having a Social Security number, application will need to be made at the nearest Office of the Social Security Administration.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

ADVISING – The University offers a three part advising program for both currently enrolled and entering students. Assistance is given students (1) in course selection, (2) with registration, and (3) in deciding on a major. Academic advising is conducted through the faculty in the academic schools. Advisors help students with their schedules, but the primary obligation for knowing all graduation requirements rests with the student.

Any student who withdraws from the University or withdraws from a specific class after completing the registration/fee paying process must do so officially through the office of The Registrar. *Failure to attend class does not constitute a withdrawal.*

CUMBERLAND UNIVERSITY DROP POLICY – When a student decreases the number of hours attempted during a term, a refund may be calculated based upon the official drop date as presented to the Registrar's Office. Credits are based on the fees, not the amount paid. If the student is receiving financial assistance, credits will be returned to the financial aid accounts, including lenders of student loans, before any money is returned to the student. All class change request or withdrawals from the University must be made through the Office of the Registrar. This must be done by the dates stated in the semester calendar

Refund or credit on account of residence hall rent after registration must be approved by the Vice President for Student Affairs. Refunds will be granted on a pro-rata basis when the student is forced to withdraw from the residence halls for personal medical reasons confirmed by a licensed physician, or at the request of CU management personnel for other than disciplinary reasons. No refund will be made other than under the above circumstances.

When a student who has received federal financial aid (Pell Grants, FSEOG Grants, Federal Perkins Loans, Federal Stafford Loans or Federal Parent Loans for Undergraduates) completely withdraws from the University, the unearned portion of the aid must be returned to the program. The unearned portion is calculated up to the first 60% of the enrollment period. The federal government has set the order in which unearned aid must be returned to the programs. Students should note that the requirement to return the unearned portion of federal aid might leave them owing a balance due to Cumberland University.

RESIDENCE HALLS

Questions concerning residence life should be addressed to the Director of Residence Life. Rooms are assigned on a first-come, first-serve basis. All students wishing to live in the residence halls must complete a residence hall application before each semester (all summer terms, fall, and spring).

All students must have paid the \$200.00 security deposit before being allowed to move in.

All students must also be official in the Business Office before they will be issued housing keys. Students must be enrolled in at least three (3) semester hours each May or summer term in which they are living in campus housing.

Students not taking classes during May or summer will not be allowed to live in campus housing.

THE PAYMENT OF TUITION/FEES IS THE FINAL STEP IN THE REGISTRATION PROCESS

Registration will not be complete and students cannot attend classes until all tuition/fees are paid or appropriate arrangements for payment

have been made with the Business Office, Room 109, Memorial Hall. A student must have paid all balances owed the University before the end of each semester. Cumberland offers several payment options to facilitate the student with their final step of registration.

Methods of payment are: cash; personal check; money order; and credit cards. Financial Assistance is available to those students who qualify. Students should see the Office of Financial Services, Memorial Hall, Room 103 for assistance.

- PAYMENT IN FULL.** CU will accept a personal check or money order for the total balance due. Checks should be made payable to Cumberland University and include the student's enrolling full name on the face of the check. The University also accepts VISA, MasterCard, American Express and Discover. Payments may also be made online by credit card or electronic check at: <http://www.cumberland.edu/ePortal.html>
- MONTHLY PAYMENTS.** Students may make monthly payments on their account by enrolling in the FACTS Payment Plan. Contracts may be completed online at: http://www.cumberland.edu/financial_aid/e_cashier.html Payments are automatically withdrawn from a checking or savings account, or a credit card account on the 5th or the 20th of each month. Contact the Business Office at 615-547-1250 or 615-547-1218 for more information.
- THIRD PARTY PROMISSORY NOTE.** CU also offers a DEFERRED payment plan to those students whose employer / responsible party has agreed to pay for their classes. Students must sign a "Third Party Promissory Note" stating the employer / responsible party will pay the balance on completion of classes at the end of the semester. The student must also submit a signed statement from their employer on company letterhead.

A student who has a balance of more than one semester in arrears will not be permitted to register for further classes until the account is paid current.

Should any pending credits to a student's account fail to materialize, or for any other reason result in a balance due, students may be subject to finance charges. In the event the account remains unpaid and is referred to a collection agency, the student will be responsible for all collection agency fees and/or attorney fees associated with collections.

All students must contact the Business Office (even if their tuition is paid by a third party or covered by scholarship) to confirm that their classes are correct, their charges are correct (tuition, room and board, additional fees, etc) and payment arrangements have been made.

All students must have a CU parking sticker and a CU ID card with the appropriate stamp on the back.

PRIORITY REGISTRATION

CURRENTLY ENROLLED STUDENTS are encouraged to take advantage of the early advising and priority selection of classes for the summer and fall terms. Class space will be filled on a first-come, first served basis, by the number of credit hours earned.

ENTERING STUDENTS – All students enrolling for the first time must complete all admission requirements/processes prior to beginning registration. Specific questions should be addressed to the Office of Admissions at (615-547-1224 or 615-547-1280).

STUDENTS NEARING GRADUATION – Any student nearing graduation is encouraged to complete the registration process as soon as possible in order that space may be reserved in the needed classes. The University does not guarantee a specific course will be offered during the anticipated final term of enrollment. The University urges students who are nearing graduation to consult with the Vice President of Academic Affairs, the Associate Registrar, the Academic School Dean, and/or their advisor to ensure that the needed courses or appropriate substitutions will be offered during their remaining term (s) of enrollment.

SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS – The University uses the Social Security number for permanent/official record purposes. To facilitate your registration please have this number with you upon arrival. For those not having a Social Security number, application will need to be made at the nearest Office of the Social Security Administration.

ACADEMIC INFORMATION

ADVISING – The University offers a three part advising program for both currently enrolled and entering students. Assistance is given students (1) in course selection, (2) with registration, and (3) in deciding on a major. Academic advising is conducted through the faculty in the academic schools. Advisors help students with their schedules, but the primary obligation for knowing all graduation requirements rests with the student.

Any student who withdraws from the University or withdraws from a specific class after completing the registration/fee paying process must do so officially through the office of The Registrar. *Failure to attend class does not constitute a withdrawal.*

CU policy prohibits students from dropping courses in the Developmental Studies Program. Under extenuating circumstances a course may be dropped with the approval of the Vice President of Academic Affairs.

PRE-REQUISITE – A prerequisite is a course or other specific preparation that must be completed before enrollment in an advanced course. Students are responsible for determining, prior to registration, if they have met all prerequisite requirements for any class in which enrollment is completed. Prerequisite information is contained in the course description sections of the Cumberland University catalog. Specific questions should be addressed to the Vice President for Academic Affairs, or the Coordinator of Academic Services or the Director of the school in the area in which the student is majoring. As a general rule, a grade of at least "C" or permission of the instructor of the course must be obtained before advancing to the next sequential course.

RELEASE OF INFORMATION – The University complies with all provisions of the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 dealing with the release of educational records. No information, except directory information, contained in any student's records is released to persons outside the University or to unauthorized persons on the campus without the written consent of the student. The University reserves the right not to release directory information. Directory information includes name, home address, school address, telephone listing, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and heights of members of the athletic team, dates of attendance, Deans List, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational institution attended. This information may be released to appear in public documents and may be otherwise disclosed without student consent unless a written request not to release information is filed, each semester with the Registrar.

No official academic information about a student will be released until all University requirements, forms, payments, and records are complete. All requests for official University academic transcripts must be submitted in writing to the Registrar. There is a charge of five (\$5.00) dollars for each transcript. Specific questions concerning the Release of Information and transcript preparation should be directed to office of the Registrar (615-547-1227)

ACADEMIC ASSISTANCE – Students who need extra help in any course are urged to make an appointment with the instructor to seek assistance as soon as a problem develops. Free tutoring is available by contacting the Academic Enrichment Center. (615-547-1285).

GENERAL INFORMATION

The University reserves the right to add, combine, or delete from this schedule, and to make any changes in listed faculty teaching assignments, class times and/or room designations.

Specific course descriptions for all classes listed in the Timetable may be found in the Cumberland University Catalog, or in the minutes of the Dean's Council.

CU is regionally accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award associate, baccalaureate and master's degrees.

CU is in compliance with all known federal, state and local regulations regarding non-discrimination. The University reserves the right to video tape or audio tape any class for educational purpose.

SERVICES

FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE – Questions concerning Financial Assistance (including work and loan programs) should be addressed to the office of Student Financial Services (615-547-1243). Because of the limited resources available and the length of time necessary to complete the required paper work, students needing assistance are encouraged to begin the process at the earliest possible date. Students not having financial assistance will be expected to pay all tuition and fees during the registration/fee paying process.

I. D. CARDS – These documents are made or updated for all students during the registration fee paying process. Returning students should bring their current student I. D. Card to facilitate the fee paying or registration process. There will be a charge of fifteen (\$15.00) dollars for any ID cards re-made during the registration fee paying, or at any other time during the semester. Students with a meal plan will need to present a validated I.D. card in order to receive meals in the Phillips Dining Hall. Any student may be asked to present an I.D. when checking out library materials. I.D. cards are available in the Student Affairs Office on the 2nd floor of Labry Hall.

PARKING – All students who operate any kind of motor vehicle on University property must have a current parking permit. This permit may be obtained during the registration fee paying process. This permit must be displayed prior to the first day of class and each day thereafter. Permits are available in the Student Affairs Office.

TEXTBOOKS/SUPPLIES – Materials for all courses taught at CU may be purchased at the University Bookstore. Specific questions concerning this service should be addressed to the Bookstore Manager. The Bookstore is located in Labry Hall (615-547-1236).

HOUSING – All students must complete a housing application and pay the \$200.00 room deposit prior to the beginning of each semester. Students must be official (all charges paid in the Business Office) before being allowed to move into the residence halls. Please contact the University Housing Office with questions about student housing (615-547-1231).

CUMBERLAND UNIVERSITY WITHDRAWAL POLICY

When a student decreases the number of hours attempted during a term, a refund may be calculated based upon the official drop date as presented to the Registrar's Office. Credits are based on the tuition charges, not the amount paid. If the student is receiving financial assistance, credits will be returned to the financial aid accounts, including lenders of student loans, before any money is returned to the student.

Withdrawals from school for any reason, during any term, must be made by official notification to the Registrar's Office. Failure to attend classes does not cancel enrollment.

The federal refund calculation policy will be used for students who have attended classes at CU and are receiving Title IV financial assistance.

Withdrawal will be effective from the date which formal application for withdrawal is filed with the Registrar. The policy for fall is as follows:

The last day to register and add a class is Friday, September 3, 2010.

The last day to drop a class with a grade of "W" is Monday, September 20, 2010.

The last day to drop a class and receive a grade of "WP" or "WF" is Thursday, October 28, 2010.

1. Withdrawing from school on or before August 31st, you will receive a full refund.
2. Withdrawing from school 6th through the 15th day of classes, the student will be responsible for 50% of all charges. (September 1st-September 15th)
3. Withdrawing from school September 16-October 28 the student will be responsible for 75% of all charges (September 17-October 28).
4. After October 28, 2010 no refund will be given.

Refund or credit on account of residence hall rent after registration must be approved by the Vice President of Student Affairs. Refunds will be granted on a pro-rata basis when the student is forced to withdraw from the residence hall for personal medical reasons confirmed by a licensed physician, or at the request of Cumberland University management personnel for other than disciplinary reasons. No refund will be made other than under the above circumstances.

When a student who has received federal financial aid (PELL Grants, FSEOG Grants, Federal Perkins Loans, Federal Stafford Loans or Federal Parent Loans for Undergraduates) completely withdraws from the University; the unearned portion of the aid must be returned to the program. The unearned portion is calculated up to the first 60% of the enrollment period. The calculations are made on a pro-rata basis, based upon the total enrollment period. The federal government has set the order in which unearned aid must be returned to the programs. Students should note that the requirement to return the unearned portion of federal financial aid might leave them owing a balance due to Cumberland University.

Students withdrawing from the University must contact the Registrar, the Financial Assistance Office, The Housing Director and the Business Office.

- THIRD PARTY PROMISSORY NOTE.** CU also offers a DEFERRED payment plan to those students whose employer/responsible party has agreed to pay for their classes. Students must sign a "Third Party Promissory Note" stating the employer/responsible party will pay the balance on completion of classes at the end of the semester. The student must also submit a signed statement from their employer on company letterhead.

A student who has a balance of more than one semester in arrears will not be permitted to register for further classes until the account is paid current.

Should any pending credits to a student's account fail to materialize, or for any other reason result in a balance due, students may be subject to finance charges. In the event the account remains unpaid and is referred to a collection agency, the student will be responsible for all collection agency fees and/or attorney fees associated with collections.
