## From the Dean

*Therefore let us also, seeing we are compassed about with so great a cloud of witnesses, lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus the author and perfecter of our faith.*

—Hebrews 12:1-2a (ASV)

If you sport a “26.2” decal or magnetic sticker on your car, you may have been to Boston sometime in the last three years. If you have tattooed this number on the back of your neck or at the base of your spine, you probably know the qualifying times for most of the major North American marathons. If, instead of sheep, you fall asleep at night counting kilometers (42, to be exact), you may well claim a top-notch orthopedist as your closest friend.

Those who train for long distance running belong to a special breed. Running is a way of life for them. Nearly everything they think, say, and do turns on their passion for the race well run. An average week of training for the devoted marathon competitor might include several hours of stretching, consideration of hydration and nutritional needs, selection of clothing and shoes for maximum protection and support of the body in every kind of weather, and forty miles on the road.

The relative inconveniences of marathon training can affect where you choose to live—city, village, country, mountains, piedmont, beach. They might even influence your choice of profession. After all, only the most considerate of bosses excuses the early Friday departure of the employee who invariably shows up late, sore, and limping on Monday morning.

Above all, however, a runner must be patient. To sit and contemplate beforehand the rigors of the full 26.2 miles—the sudden tightening of muscles, the thirst, the burn, the release, the wall, the final half-mile—might cause the novice to despair, and even the veteran to reconsider. But patiently to set one foot in front of the other, with steady rhythm and certainty, one eye on the ground, and one fixed on the finish line—this is the discipline that feeds the passion that ushers the runner into the joy of his sacrifice.

The New Testament racing metaphor must not be lost on the Christian. Although we may decorate our cars and our bodies with emblems of the Great Race, the practices of discipleship will steel our hearts for the Resurrection celebration. This Lenten season—a period of sustained spiritual exercise—is designed to transform us into a people expressing in all we think, say, and do, our passion for Christ: crucified, risen, ascended, and coming again.

Confession, communion, fidelity, justice, witness, prayer, acts of mercy, and forgiveness: to contemplate taking on this full spectrum of discipleship—all 26.2 miles of it—may overwhelm even the most faithful among us. But patiently to set one foot in front of the other, steadily, always leading with love, one eye on the ground, and one fixed on the Cross—this is the discipline that feeds the passion that ushers the baptized into the joy of Christ’s sacrifice.

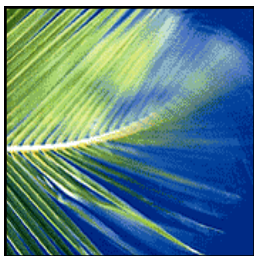

## Good Friday:

In recent years the Cathedral has been open on Good Friday from 12 p.m. noon to 3 p.m. This observance is to commemorate the traditional three hours that Jesus hung on the cross. The first hour is devoted to the Good Friday Liturgy from the Book of Common Prayer. During the latter two hours people are able to be present in the Cathedral for quiet prayer and meditation. Vergers are available at the narthex to welcome those who come to the Cathedral to visit or to pray. At 3 p.m., after the Cathedral bell sounds the hour, the bell is tolled thirty-three times to commemorate each of the years of Jesus' life.

## Services of Holy Week



Holy Week begins on **Palm Sunday** with the Liturgy of the Palms, which celebrates Jesus' entry into Jerusalem. The celebrant gives thanks over the branches, and there is a festive procession with songs of "Hosanna in the highest!" as we enact the event which led directly to Good Friday. The second part of the Palm Sunday liturgy changes from triumph to tragedy as it focuses on the suffering and death of Jesus. The account of the Lord's Passion is read from the Gospel.

**Tenebrae** is the Latin word for "darkness" or "shadows." The most conspicuous feature of the service is the gradual extinguishing of candles and other lights until only a single candle, considered a symbol of our Lord, remains. Toward the end of the service, this candle is hidden, typifying the apparent victory of the forces of evil. At the very end, a loud noise is made, symbolizing the earthquake at the time of Christ's death. The hidden candle is restored to its place and by its light, all depart in silence.

**Maundy Thursday** is a celebration of our Lord's institution of the sacrament of his Body and Blood, but it is pervaded by the shadow of the cross. Because Jesus gathered with his friends in the context of the Passover, this was a farewell dinner in which Jesus, by washing his disciples' feet, sought to illustrate one final time the character of love and ministry which is central in the life to which he calls us. We hear the ancient instructions for celebrating the Passover and Paul's account of the institution of the Eucharist.

On **Good Friday** we hear John's account of the Lord's trial, suffering, and death. We engage in intense intercessory prayer for the church and for the world. It was on the cross that Jesus made his full intercession for us, and we are united with him through Baptism in that intercession. At the end of the liturgy, the church is left in silence and darkness.

The **Holy Saturday** liturgy recalls Jesus' burial and reminds us that the day is a period of preparation for the great celebration of Easter.

**The Great Vigil of Easter** is unlike any other service in the year. We celebrate the Passover of Jesus from death into life and our own Passover from death into life in Holy Baptism. The service has four parts. First is the Service of Light, in which the light of Christ is rekindled in the darkness. During the Vigil, we celebrate and make present stories of major events of salvation history. Baptism of children and adults is celebrated. The Bishop is present to preside at Confirmation, Reception and the Renewal of Baptism vows at this first Eucharist of Easter.

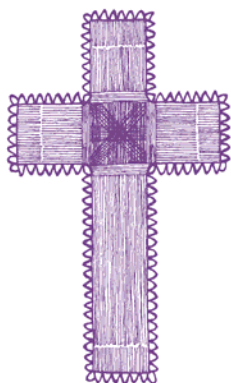

Literary scholars contend that no other modern American writer of the twentieth century has constructed a fictional world so energetically and forthrightly charged by religious investigation as the one Flannery O'Connor has created. As a "literary theologian," O'Connor demonstrated that religion, far from being an impediment to art, may serve as the vital center of the artist's imagination.

This series will focus on three of her short stories - *Revelation*, *The Displaced Person*, and *Parker's Back*. The recurring theme for this series will be: "What universal themes from the human drama of existence has Flannery O'Connor *incarnated* in language and what theological statements does she invite us to examine?"

Victor Judge serves as a lecturer at Vanderbilt University Divinity School where he teaches courses on the literary theologians Flannery O'Connor, Albert Camus, John Donne, Emily Dickinson, and Gerard Manley Hopkins, S.J. He also serves as the School's registrar, as editor of the theological magazine *The Spire*, and as advisor to *Marginalia: to the Least of These*, a student group dedicated to working with the homeless. He received his undergraduate and graduate degrees from George Peabody College for Teachers and is in the thirtieth year of his vocation in higher education.

## **Amistad 2010 A Pilgrimage**

**Pilgrims:** Jessica Middleton, Holly Westcott and Chuck Sullivan

I just returned from another incredible trip to Bolivia to see our children at Amistad. I had hoped for our group to experience closeness to God, and I was amply rewarded. We felt the hugs of the children. We witnessed the perseverance of their caretakers. We saw the beauty of the mountains. We tasted the tropical flavors of the local fruits. We shared a common bond through our adventures to Aramisi. We prayed for our families and our new friends. We experienced God in a personal way. Who cannot be touched by the love so freely given by these abandoned, abused, and orphaned children?

Each day brought new adventures. We learned to communicate with our limited Spanish. We saw the tragedy and inspiration of the 151 children struggling for love in the state run orphanage of Solomon Klein. We climbed to the top of the Christos de la Concordia. We hiked along the goat and sheep trails in Aramisi. We attended the first annual awards celebration to mark the start of the new school year. We helped organize the treasured photo albums. One boy showed me a picture of his Mom and Dad; one girl gave me a prized picture of herself because we had bonded. We explored the city as we bumped over the cobbled roads. We said Morning Prayer and Compline in the chapel at La Morada and reflected on how our hearts were touched. We talked about how God had called each of us to come to Bolivia. We felt the tears as we said goodbye on our last day. I know I will return. Amistad has a special place in my heart.

On our last day the boy's Youth House (ages 17-20) and the boy's teenage house (ages 14-17) scheduled a soccer game. I was not going to help my team (the teenage house) very much due to my lack of expertise, but I was going to try my best. It is hard to run for more than a minute at a time due to the altitude. Cochabamba is at 9,000 feet. Most of La Villa came out to watch. After the game had progressed for over an hour and a half we were still tied at 8 to 8. This epic and memorable game came down to the final play in overtime. Below is a recap of the final play as told by Chris King.

"With winded players jockeying for position at the far end of the cancha and ominous clouds approaching from the north, our goalie, Marco, pivoted, and like a discus thrower, hurled the ball high into the air. It fell to Chris, who volleyed it back to Gonzalo on the left side of the cancha. Gonzalo controlled the ball, dribbled twice to avoid a defender, and fired a laser through the legs of the goalie and into the back of the fenced net. The elusive golden goal and a 9-8 victory for Casa San Martín! For the first time, the older boys' youth house had been defeated by the younger boys of Casa San Martín. Handshakes and congratulations followed, as players on both sides appreciated the efforts displayed during this memorable contest. It was certainly one of the most thrilling games in recent Villa history."
